Regulatory Update

OSHA has released the scorecard on its citations for fiscal year 2008. The top ten standards that were cited and the top two sections cited of each standard are:

- **Scaffolding General Requirements**
 - Failure to provide fall protection
 - Failure to ensure adequate platform construction
- **Hazard Communication**
 - Failure to develop and maintain a written program
 - Failure to maintain training
- **Fall Protection General Requirements**
 - Failure to provide protection in residential construction
 - Failure to use guardrail, safety net, or personal fall arrest
- **Respiratory Protection**
 - Failure to establish a program
 - Failure to provide a medical evaluation to determine ability to use a respirator
- **Lockout/Tagout**
 - Failure to develop a procedure
 - Failure to conduct periodic inspections.
- **Electrical Wiring Methods**
 - Failure to use flexible cords and cables properly
 - Failure to effectively close conductors entering boxes or cabinets
- **Powered Industrial Trucks**
 - Failure to ensure truck operators are competent to operate the truck
 - Failure to evaluate truck operators performance at least every three years
- **Ladders**
 - Failure to extend straight ladder at 3 feet above upper landing
 - Using ladder for purpose other than designed
- **Machine Guarding General Requirements**
 - Failure to provide guarding
 - Failure to guard point of operation machines
- **Electrical General Requirements**
 - Failure to install electrical equipment according to factory instructions
 - Failure to keep work spaces clear

Guidelines for Incentive Programs

Any time I address a roomful of supervisors about safety, inevitably someone will raise a hand to talk about the great incentive program they know about from some company they worked at a decade before. “You got a prize if your department could go a month without injuries”, etc.”

It is not my practice to recommend incentive programs. For one thing, I am skeptical of the ability of incentives to make people safer than their own supervision expects them to be. Unless there is a supervisory safety accountability system which mirrors the goals of the incentive program, the incentives' effect will wane quickly, and the incentive will end up as just another safety gimmick.

Incentives are no substitute for management commitment and involvement, leading indicator based accountability, and a safety process with whole-company safety involvement. If they actually worked, why would you even need safety people? Just take the safety salary budget and add it to the prizes.

It's my belief that spending time and money on safety tricks that don't work is one reason that safety professionals are not all regarded with the same confidence as, say, mechanical engineers or accountants. We're often looked at as necessary evils, pests, waste of money that could instantly disappear were OSHA to no longer exist, all sorts of bad things, when we should be welcomed because we're indispensable assets for a safe workplace and the maximum productivity that springs from it.

If you must try an incentive program, I have some suggestions as to the do's and don'ts. The following are my Thirteen Guidelines for Incentives.

Incentive programs should:

1. Have a definite, clearly stated ending point so they do not drag on forever and take on a life of their own.
2. Be well publicized so everyone who should know of the program does.
3. Promote something people can do to win which should also be emphasized by supervisors, and not just something they shouldn't do, like hurt themselves;
4. Not be too complicated for people to understand what it takes to succeed.
5. Have a good chance of success if you do what the program requires (no giant drawings for one winner).
6. Be carried out from start to finish exactly as they have been described.
7. Have a good selection of prizes to attract repeat winners.
8. Be unbiased so everyone can see they all have a fair chance.
9. Be fun, sure, but not silly. There should be some credibility.
10. Not end too early because of one individual's error (example: somebody gets hurt on the first day of the month – now we have no incentive until next month).
11. Have a re-entry provision to keep people involved even after they “lose”.
12. Be considered a promotion rather than a program.
13. Be legal – it may be necessary to withhold taxes from the prizes. It can be a little hard to put a handle on what size prizes are taxable, but they are considered to be income by the IRS.

Doors will open at 7:30am and the program will begin promptly at 8:30am.

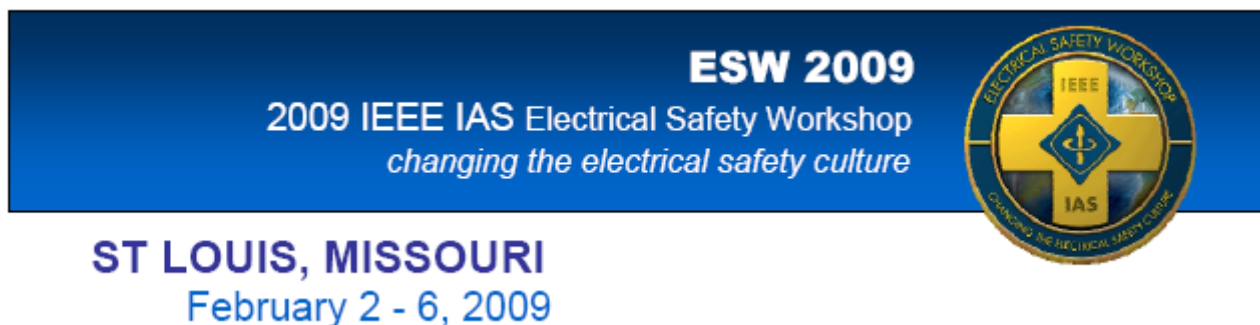

Celebrating North American Occupational Safety and Health (NAOSH) Week May 3 – 9, 2009 and Occupational Safety and Health Professional Day May 6, 2009

Please read and follow all the rules carefully so that all posters/drawings will be eligible. The posters that best illustrate job safety will be selected as winners. Before the children begin drawing, we urge you to talk to them about your job and workplace safety and provide examples of what risks occupational safety, health and environmental professionals address every day on the job, and if possible, provide them with examples of workplace situations. Visit www.asse.org/naosh for examples of children's workplace safety posters and ASSE's "Safety Through the Decades" timeline. Have fun and as they say in the in the Wild, Wild, West "Draw Partner".

POSTER CONTEST RULES

1. Entry is open to ASSE – St. Louis Chapter members' children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews between the ages of 5 and 14. Chapters and members can also sponsor schools and students from their communities, from their workplace, etc. There are five age categories with a first, second, third and fourth place winner from each age category which are: 1) ages 5-6; 2) ages 7-8; 3) ages 9-10; 4) ages 11-12; and, 5) ages 13-14. Children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews of ASSE employees may not enter.
2. The poster drawing must relate to the theme 'Safety-on-the-Job' and should illustrate an example of safety at work. As you know, the description of the workplace is wide-ranging -- it can be at an office, a manufacturing plant, on the road, in a plane, on a train, a ship, a dock, at home, on the football field, a store, fire or police department, construction sites, state capitols, parks, pools, schools, etc. Encourage your children to be creative.
3. **The finished poster must be no larger than 11" x 14".** Designs should be submitted on quality poster illustration board or heavy paper. Crayons, magic markers or color pencils only should be used. Those larger than 11" x 14" will be disqualified.
4. Only one entry per child will be allowed. Parents/sponsors are limited to verbal assistance only. All drawings must be an individual effort and be free-hand originals. No traced pictures please.
5. Each poster must have the contestants name, age, address, telephone number, family e-mail address, and sponsoring ASSE member name and member number clearly printed on the **entry form and attached to the back of the poster to be eligible.** Also, add the name of the school they attend and their hobbies.
6. All entries **MUST** be brought to the **Monday, February 9, 2009** Chapter Meeting at Sybergs, 2430 Old Dorsett Road, Maryland Heights, MO (270 and Dorsett.) All entries become the property of ASSE once submitted. However, we return all entries to the entrants by the end of the summer.
7. Criteria for judging---creativity and how well the poster expresses the contest theme 'Safety-on-the-Job.'
8. Winning posters will be announced in March 2009. All persons in attendance at the February 9, 2009 Chapter Meeting will vote to choose the winners.
9. Prizes will be awarded to each winner. The first place winner in each age group will receive a \$100 check.
10. All posters will be forwarded by the ASSE – St. Louis Chapter to the ASSE National Poster Contest for judging.
